After stepping down, I intend to remain at UAB as Professor and Director of the Center for Metabolic Bone Disease and to continue my research focused on the role of calcium, the calcium receptor protein, calmodulin, and related protein kinases and phosphatases in 1) osteoporosis and metabolic bone disease, 2) the pathogenesis of AIDS-related bone disease, and 3) malignant transformation and tumorigenesis.

I will also participate in university-wide research activities including those involving clinical and translational research, career development, and activities of the consortium of University-Wide Centers.

T. Scott Isbell

Mr. T. Scott Isbell, Presiding Officer of the Molecular and Cellular Pathology Graduate Program, has been chosen to receive the 2007 UAB Graduate School Dean's award, the Samuel B. Barker Award for Excellence in Graduate Studies, at the Ph.D. level. This award is given each spring to one Ph.D. student who will receive their degree within the calendar year.

Mr. Isbell entered the graduate program in 2003 joining the laboratory of Dr. Rakesh Patel. His dissertation research has focused on elucidating the mechanisms of nitric oxide interactions with red blood cells.

Mr. Isbell has demonstrated exceptionally strong leadership, as Vice Presiding Officer and now as Presiding Officer of the graduate program. Mr. Isbell led the implementation of an annual departmental research day. This research day has been well received by his fellow students and will further strengthen the quality of our graduate program. recently, Mr. Isbell along with Vice Presiding officer Brian Dranka, was instrumental in the restructuring of a graduate course designed to prepare students with the skills necessary to orally present data at national scientific meetings. He is an active member of the graduate recruitment committee.

Mr. Isbell is first or co-first author on three publications & middle author on four others. He was recently selected to attend the National Institutes of Health National Graduate Student Research Festival (2006) His past honors include the Science Award at the 2005 NIH Role of Nitrite in Physiology, Patho-physiology and Therapeutics Mtg and the Young Investigator's Award at the 2004 Society for Free Radical Biology & Medicine annual meeting. He has consistently received awards at Graduate Student Research Day and is a member of the Phi Sigma Biology Honor Society. He was a finalist for the Marshall Sherfield Fellowship.

FACULTY PROFILES



Cheryl A. Palmer, M.D. Associate Professor, Neuropathology

Dr. Cheryl Palmer has been a member of the Division of Neuropathology since 1993. Initially trained at the University of Pittsburgh with a B. S. degree in pharmacy, she subsequently returned to West Virginia University for medical school. Dr. Palmer's long-standing fascination with the workings of the brain led to seven years of residency and dual board certification in Neurology and Neuropathology.

Since 1997, Dr. Palmer has been the Director of the Neuropathology Fellowship Program, an ACGME-accredited program leading to board-eligibility. She has been recognized with an award as "Best Teaching Faculty" from the UAB Department of Neurology. She serves as a reviewer for numerous neurology and neuropathology journals and is active in the American Association of Neuropathologists. Her research involves the neuropathologic findings in chronic epilepsy. With an interest in brain tumor neuropathology, Dr. Palmer also serves as the central neuropathology reviewer for several national neuro-oncology clinical trials.

When not at UAB, Dr. Palmer is the proud mother of a 7-year-old son, an avid birdwatcher and a baseball fan. She and her family love to travel, and she is a soprano in several local choral organizations.



Xu Cao, Ph.D. Professor, Molecular and Cellular Pathology

Xu Cao joined UAB Department of Pathology in 1996 upon completing 5 years of postdoc training with Seven Teitelbaum at Washington University. Xu was promoted to associate professor in 2000 and full professor in 2004.

Xu was initially recruited as a bone biologist. His primary research interest is the mechanisms of differentiation of multipotential stem cells into functionally distinct cell types, particularly, the function TGFb/BMP in osteoprogenitor differentiation. There are 5 patents that have been filed based on discoveries from his lab, one of which was licensed by P&G Pharmaceutical Company with a \$30 million investment for anti-osteoporosis drug screening. His recent finding of Endofin as key regulator for BMP signaling was published in the Journal Cell Science with the key point highlighted in the front cover and two commentaries in the same Journal. His current research has revealed that TGFb1 functions as a coupling factor for bone resorption and formation during bone remodeling and a novel PTH signaling mechanism. Merck Pharmaceuticals has expressed its interest in collaboration with his lab for developing drug targets based his recent discoveries.



C. Bruce Alexander, M.D. Professor and Vice Chair

Dr. Alexander came to UAB in 1979. He was appointed Vice Chair and Residency Program Director in 1990. He has been an Associate Medical Examiner for Jefferson County since 1980 and Section Head of Autopsy Pathology since 2000. Dr. Alexander teaches the Pulmonary Segment of Correlative Pathology; lectures in General Pathology and is very active in the training of Pathology residents. He is the faculty advisor to Alpha Omega Alpha, and on its national Board of Directors. In 2002, he received the Parker Palmer "Courage to Teach" Award from the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education. He was a founding member of the Program Directors Section of the Association of Pathology Chairs and served a six year term on the Pathology Residency Review Committee for Accreditation of Graduate Medical Education.

In October 2006, Dr. Alexander was asked to visit the Republic of Mali in Western Africa to present a training workshop and laboratory inspection for the Malaria Research Training Center in Bamako, Mali. Initiated in 1989, the MRTC is a collaborative effort between the NIH, the WHO, and the government of Mali, with additional support from a number of USAID programs and other agencies.



C. Andrew Robinson, Ph.D. Professor, Laboratory Medicine

Dr. Robinson, Professor in the Division of Laboratory Medicine, received his Ph.D. degree in 1970 from the University of Alabama in the field of biochemistry. After post-doctoral training, in 1972, he joined the UAB faculty, a mere 35 years ago, making him the most-experienced member of the division. He currently serves as Forensic Toxicologist for the Jefferson County Medical Examiners' Office and holds several positions at University Hospital. Dr. Robert Brissie recalls that prior to Dr. Robinson's appointment to the Jefferson County Medical Examiners' Office in the mid-1980s, toxicology results would take months, hampering criminal investigations for very long times. These problems no longer exist since Dr. Robinson has been in charge of the tests.

He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Clinical Chemistry, runs Pathology's Toxicology Laboratory for the Jefferson County Coroner's Office, is the medical director of the Office of Bedside Testing for the UAB Health System, and the medical director of the University Emergency Department laboratory at University Hospital. In his spare time, he is a gentleman farmer, avid hunter, and devoted husband and father."




