It is an honor to have been selected as the next Chairman of Pathology at UAB. The Department has grown dramatically over the last eighteen years under the leadership of Dr. Jay McDonald and has reached unprecedented heights in national recognition. The Chronicle of Higher Education recently ranked the UAB Department of Pathology Graduate Student Program third in the country based on faculty scholarship data determined by Academic Analytics. Similarly, based on 2007 NIH grant award data, UAB ranks sixth in the country for funding to Departments of Pathology. In addition to an outstanding research enterprise, the Department is home to a cadre of internationally-recognized physicians offering expert clinical and diagnostic services across a wide array of pathology subdisciplines. These faculty members, in combination with an excellent group of residents and fellows, perform approximately seven million laboratory tests and over 40,000 surgical pathology examinations per year. FACULTY PROFILES



Aimee Landar, Ph.D.
Assistant Professor of Pathology, Division of Molecular and Cellular Pathology

Dr. Aimee Landar is Assistant Professor in the Department of Pathology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Dr. Landar followed an unusual path to this position by earning a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of South Alabama in Mobile in flute performance. When asked about this, she replied, "I was initially committed to study Biology with a Music minor, but within the first year I transferred completely to a Music major. This was a difficult decision for me, but I found the musical training to be more personally challenging and exciting than the Biology program, which was very didactic.' However, in the Biology program she developed a curiosity about research, so she pursued a small research project on a volunteer basis. This initial experience led to multiple laboratory experiences as an undergraduate over the next four years which opened the doors for her to pursue a doctoral degree in Basic Medical Sciences (Pharmacology) at the University of South Alabama, In 1998, she initially joined UAB to study protein structure-function, and then later transitioned into free radical biology as a Post Doctoral fellow. During this time. she received a National Research Service Award from the NIH.

In 2005, Dr. Landar was appointed to the faculty in the Department of Pathology and has developed a research program focused on the mechanisms of protein modification by reactive oxygen and nitrogen species (ROS/RNS), and electrophiles. The ultimate goal of these projects is to apply these concepts to the prevention and treatment of chronic diseases such as atherosclerosis, cancer, obesity and liver inflammation.

Michael Conner, M.D. Associate Professor of Pathology

Div. of Anatomic PathologyDr. Conner joined the UAB Pathology
Department faculty in July 1992 following a ten-year career in private practice in Jackson, Mississippi. At UAB he initially

worked under the tutelage of the late Dr. Hazel Gore, where he developed a strong interest in gynecologic pathology as his specialty.

Dr. Conner attended the University of Alabama undergraduate school and School of Medicine. Following medical school he had a brief career as a pediatrician, completing a one year pediatric internship, which quickly disabused him of the idea of spending the remainder of his working life doing such things. He completed his anatomic and clinical pathology residency, a hematopathology fellowship, and surgical pathology fellowship at UAB. While in medical school he was a "Lupton" fellow during the time when Dr. Lupton was actually the Chair of the Pathology Department.

Dr. Conner's service time is devoted exclusively to gynecologic pathology. His research projects are varied and are mostly collaborative efforts with faculty in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. One of his largest projects is an ongoing HPV vaccine study. Among his more time-consuming activities are the Gynecologic Tumor Board, reviewing outside consults, and serving as the Gynecologic Oncology Group pathologist for UAB.

Dr. Conner teaches in the SOM, having served as the Coursemaster for the Reproductive Segment of Correlative Pathology for the past thirteen years. He plans on assuming a reduced role in the Reproductive Module of the new medical school curriculum. Dr. Conner was the Interim Head of Surgical Pathology from 2001 to 2003.

Outside of work, Dr. Conner spends much of his time woodworking, off-roading in an old Jeep, and with his wife Karen enjoying their four children and first grandchild (Anne Marie, born February 2008). He looks forward to fulfilling a longtime goal of restoring an old 1960's era VW bus when he eventually retires.



Ken B. Waites, MD Professor of Pathology, Head of Microbiology, Division of Laboratory

Medicine

Dr. Ken Waites is Professor in the Departments of Pathology & Microbiology, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, and Critical and Diagnostic Care. He received his medical degree and completed residency at UAB, and then joined UAB as the Co-Director

of the Diagnostic Mycoplasma Laboratory. In 1991, he was appointed the Director of Clinical Microbiology. and has since been a senior scientist in the UAB Injury Control Research Center, Faculty Investigator for the Mucosal HIV and Immunobiology Center, and Medical Director of UAB's Diagnostic Mycoplasma Laboratory.

Dr. Waites is involved with many, regional, national, and international committees; and is an expert in the areas of clinical microbiology, such as antibiotic resistance and mycoplasmology. From 1998-2001, he sat on the National Board of Medical Examiners Pathology Test Committee. In 2001, Dr. Waites was named Chair of the CLSI Subcommittee on Methods for Antimicrobial Susceptibility Testing for Human Mycoplasmas. He is also highly involved with the International Organization for Mycoplasmology. He is a past-chair, and is currently serving as a member of the Board of Directors.

Dr. Ken Waites has received numerous honors and awards, including election to Fellow in the Infectious Disease Society of America and the American Academy of Microbiology. He received the Division G Lecturer Award at the American Society for Microbiology General Meeting earlier this year. Since 1983, Dr. Waites has worked on over 75 grants and contracts, published hundreds of times and given over 150 oral presentations. Dr. Waites's service to patients at UAB and beyond, his dedication to teaching, and his record of research accomplishments make him one of the great role models in the Division of Laboratory Medicine.

ACCOLADES

Dr. Darshana Jhala and Dr. Nirag Jhala were invited as Guest Faculty to give a 3-day workshop at Cytopath '08 in Singapore in June 2008. This 3-day course was given on both Gyn and Non-Gyn cytology, and was attended by over 130 participants that registered from about 10 different countries of the region.

Dr. Bruce Alexander was elected President of the Academy of Clinical Laboratory Physicians and Scientists at its June 5th meeting at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Alexander is the second President of ACLPS from UAB. Dr. Jon V. Straumfjord, Jr. was the first in 1968. Dr. Jay McDonald served as President in 1987-88, while at Washington University in St. Louis. The next ACLPS meeting will be in June, 2009 at UCLA.
