Alternative Master's Program (AMP)

Welcome to the alternative master's program (AMP) in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction (C&I) at the School of Education (SOE), University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB). The first purpose of UAB's AMP is to guide prospective teachers in meeting the evolving needs of school-aged learners in today's rapidly changing society. Its second purpose is to deliver cutting-edge instruction through a standards-based, inquiry-focused approach. Based on constructivism, this approach prepares educators for using state-of-the-art instructional strategies in their own classrooms. The third purpose is to ensure that quality courses are available to graduate students who are unable to come to campus during traditional class hours. UAB's AMP is unique in how it combines online support from Canvas with a variety of delivery formats: **online, weekends, mornings, afternoons, evenings** (i.e., weekly at 5:00), **or blended** (i.e., online alternating with classes held on campus in the evening). Many courses offer a section during the day and another section that is either evenings, weekends, or online.

In this information packet, the words "student" and "candidate" are used interchangeably. Candidate refers to current and prospective certification students in the SOE.

The terms "alternative master's program (AMP)" and "fifth-year program" are interchangeable. Fifth-year means that certification candidates are starting a teacher certification program after completing a four-year UG program; it does not mean that they finish this program in the fifth year. Depending on candidates' work and other obligations, it usually takes 5 to 6 terms to finish the AMP.

This information corresponds to UAB policies and procedures in effect on the date of this packet. Newer versions of this packet take precedence over what is stated here. This packet also represents codes and regulations mandated by the Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE). To provide schools with educators prepared to meet the changing needs of today's society, the ALSDE frequently updates its [codes](#). Hence, UAB also periodically updates its certification checklists: www.uab.edu/education/checklists. If an updated certification checklist offers advantages to already-admitted candidates, they may request switching to a newer checklist. Candidates must submit their certification applications within 60 months of having graduated; if not, they are ineligible to become certified.

Candidates in Teacher Preparation Programs (traits)

Candidates for teacher preparation programs should display several traits related to **personality, motivation, decision making, communication, and critical thinking**. Strong candidates ...

- have poise, use acceptable manners and mannerisms, are neat and appropriate in appearance, are personable, possess a sense of humor, are enthusiastic, and display personal energy, vitality, and good social skills;
- are able to clearly articulate their motives and rationale for entering the teaching profession;
- demonstrate the ability to make decisions in a rational and logical manner;
- clearly articulate or explain their ideas and speak clearly and correctly using standard English; and
- demonstrate the ability to think critically.

Requirements for Applying to the AMP at UAB

1) Becoming Informed

- a) Attend an AMP information session: Mondays, 5:00-6:30 in EB 100
 - ➔ Confirm your attendance (RSVP) by emailing Dr. Spezzini (spezzeni@uab.edu), who facilitates these sessions.
 - b) Visit the website for the Department of Curriculum and Instruction www.uab.edu/education/ci and also other SOE sites.
 - c) Download the Certification Program Checklist for your projected teaching field at www.uab.edu/education/checklists
 - ➔ Click on *Alternative Master's* in left column, scroll down on right, and click on your program area/teaching field.
- The certification-based Program of Study Checklists have been approved by the ALSDE.

2) Cumulative, unrounded Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.75 — *This GPA is set and regulated by the ALSDE; it is not negotiable.*

The ALSDE requires an unrounded cumulative GPA of 2.75 for admission to academic terms following July 1, 2017. (UAB will consider appeals for a 2.5 GPA on applications for admission to spring 2017 and summer 2017.)

The cumulative GPA is posted on a degree-issuing transcript (2.75 on undergraduate degree or 3.0 on graduate degree). Transcript must be from a regionally accredited college. *NOTE: GPA cannot be "raised" by taking additional courses after graduation.*

3) Official Transcripts sent to the School of Education (SOE)

- a) Request official transcripts from all colleges attended, even if you took just one course and it appears on another transcript.
- b) Have official transcripts from each college attended (including UAB) emailed to SOEtranscripts@uab.edu
OR mailed to **SOE Office of Student Services (OSS)**, 1720 2nd Avenue South—EB 232; Birmingham, AL 35294-1250
- c) *International Transcripts:* Request course-by-course evaluation (Basic, \$160+), World Education Services www.wes.org
- d) *International Applicants:* Request an official TOEFL or IELTS score sent electronically to gradschool@uab.edu or mailed to UAB Graduate School, 1720 2nd Avenue South, Lister Hill Library—G03, Birmingham AL 35294-0013

4) Background Clearance with the ALSDE: <https://www.cogentid.com/al/indexNew.htm>

- a) Register at www.cogentid.com/AL (Dept. of Educ.), and select "Admission to Teacher Preparation Program" (or similar).
- b) Pay online with a debit or credit card, print your receipt, and have your fingerprints done within 30 days of registering.
- c) In 2 or 3 weeks, clearance will be posted for public access at <https://tcert.alsde.edu/Portal/Public/Pages/SearchCerts.aspx>

5) Alabama Educator Certification Assessment Program (AECAP): Two Exams – AECTP Basic Skills & Praxis Subject Tests

- a) When registering for these exams, you must indicate that your score reports are to be sent to UAB and to the ALSDE.
- b) You should take these exams at least one month before UAB's application deadline, e.g., take exams by June 1st to meet the July 1st deadline for submitting degree-seeking application for admission starting in the fall term.
- c) Because these exams are only offered periodically and because testing slots often fill up several weeks in advance, you should register for these exams as soon as you have decided that you want to pursue the AMP.
- d) Neither the GRE nor the MAT are required for admission to UAB's AMP (except for ESL).

6) AECTP Basic Skills (also called AECAP and formerly called APTTP): 800-294-2105, www.act.org/alabamaectp

Print the AECTP Registration Bulletin and read it carefully. For any questions, call 334-242-9983 or email aectp@alsde.edu. For admission to the AMP, the ALSDE requires passing scores on all areas of the AECAP Basic Skills test.

Passing scores are required in three areas: 5 in reading, 4 math, and 3 writing (*Retests are just in the area still needed.*)

Paper-based (at UAB and ten other colleges in Alabama), Strict registration deadline (one month in advance of test date)

2016-17, Saturdays, Sept. 17 (reg. 8/19); Nov. 19 (reg. 10/21); Jan. 14 (reg. 12/16); Mar. 4 (reg. 2/3); July 8 (reg. 6/9)

Confirmation emails usually list UAB's site as EB. Follow-up emails might give a site change (e.g., HHB, BEC).

Score: An ACT score report will arrive in the mail about 4 weeks later. **Save electronic and paper copies in your own files.**

For admission to the AMP, the ALSDE requires passing scores on Praxis subject tests in all teaching fields (except ESL & PE).

After the test, your score will appear on the screen. Although this is *unofficial*, it represents your official score.

Scores: You can access your score online about 3 weeks after the test window closes (*scores are not mailed*).

Carefully save electronic and paper copies for your own files. Fees are charged to order new score reports!

The test codes and passing scores are posted at http://www.ets.org/praxis/al/al_teacher_ed/. Scroll down to **Tests required for specific certification areas**; click on grade level (e.g., Secondary) and teaching field (e.g., Math). Because of periodic changes in codes and scores, you must visit this website before registering to take a test to know the requirements in effect on your testing date.

8) Program Requirements for specific Teaching Fields

UG degrees: Music requires an UG degree in music plus an audition. Visual arts requires an UG degree in art plus a portfolio.

Courses: A few programs have prerequisite UG courses that must be taken before admission, e.g., Math requires Calculus I, II & III.

Some programs require UG courses taken before or after admission, e.g., Elem/ECE requires Child Development & Family Relations.

Comprehensive programs (English Language Arts, General Social Studies, and General Science) have content areas required to graduate from UAB and therefore encourage students to have taken some of these content courses prior to admission.

Admission as a Degree-Seeking Student

1. Submit degree-seeking application and required documents by deadline (it's OK if your exam scores arrive a few days later):
Nov. 1st (admission to spring) **April 1st** (admission to summer) **July 1st** (admission to fall)
NOTE: If the degree-seeking deadline has passed, Secondary can consider submitting a non-degree application (see page 6).

2. Prepare for submitting your application by going first to the Graduate School website: www.uab.edu/graduate
Click on the large, green **APPLY NOW** box, currently in the upper right, which takes you to the *ApplyYourself* website.
Create an application account (be sure to write down your *ApplyYourself* username and password) and then log out.
Log into your newly-created *ApplyYourself* account and prepare your actual application.

NOTE: If you had submitted earlier applications to UAB, you must now create another ApplyYourself account.

Program and Degree: On a drop-down menu, select your targeted program and degree from among the following.

Education- <u>Arts Education</u> 5 th year (MAE)— Concentrations: music-choral, music-instrumental, visual arts (<i>Certification, grades P-12.</i>)
Education- <u>Early Childhood/Elementary</u> 5 th year (MAE)
Education- <u>English as a 2nd Language</u> 5 th year (MAE)— Concentrations: ESL cert., ESL & French cert., ESL & Spanish cert. (<i>P-12</i>)
Education- <u>High School Education</u> 5 th year (MAE) <i>Although the UAB category says High School Educ., certification is for grades 6-12.</i>
Concentrations: English, math, biology, chemistry, physics, gen. science, history, gen. social science, French (<i>P-12</i>), Spanish (<i>P-12</i>)
Education- <u>Kinesiology</u> 5 th year (MAE), i.e., Physical Education
Education- <u>Special Education</u> 5 th year (MAE)— Concentrations: Collaborative Education, Early Childhood Special Education

Admission Exams: DATE—Give the approximate month/year when you took the test or plan to take it. (This is required!)

SCORE—Leave this part blank. That's because UAB will use the score on your official score report.

Brief Summary: Write a polished essay, about 3 to 5 paragraphs (*Prepare your essay in a Word document and then insert.*)

References: Include names and email addresses of three people for providing recommendations. Select electronic or online references. That way, when you submit your application, UAB automatically emails reference forms to these people.

Application Fee: \$50 (\$60 for int'l applicants). It is highly recommended that this fee be paid online with a credit card or debit card. Click SUBMIT to pay. *NOTE: Mailing a check may delay your application by several weeks.*

Final Submit Button: Be sure to scroll to the end and click SUBMIT to send. This step is needed to submit your application.

3. **International applicants:** Pass the TOEFL, the IELTS, or the Level 5 classes at INTO UAB's English Language Programs.

4. Participate in an interview, when called.
5. Check [application status](#) periodically (www.uab.edu/graduate and click on green **APPLY NOW** link at top right). You can also inquire about status by contacting Graduate School (205-934-8357) gradschool@uab.edu, or School of Education by contacting Ms. Sha'Niethia Johnson at araccot@uab.edu. After application materials are received, it usually takes 3 to 10 weeks for your application to be processed.
6. After you are admitted as a degree-seeking student, you will receive an email from the Graduate School with the following subject line: "UAB Graduate School Admission Decision". This email will prompt you to log into an account and will provide a PIN and password to view your online decision letter. This decision letter will include the following information:
Your student number (letter "B" followed by 8 digits) *NOTE: You will need this number for identification purposes.*
Your program (e.g., High school 5th year, Elementary 5th year) and, if applicable, your concentration (e.g., Math)
Your residency status as a resident (with in-state tuition) or as a non-resident (with out-of-state tuition)
Be sure to read this information very carefully in order to make sure that everything is correct.
7. Follow the instructions in your admission letter with respect to processing a BlazerID.
You must immediately process your BlazerID at BlazerNet Central: www.uab.edu/blazerid
If you were previously a UAB student and already have a BlazerID, you MUST reactivate your BlazerID.
Your BlazerID will serve as your UAB email account (*Select 8 letters/digits that convey a professional image.*)
NOTE: You should check your UAB email regularly and must always use it in official communication with UAB.
8. **Contact your faculty advisor listed on page 2.**
9. **HEALTH:** All students (degree-seeking and non-degree seeking) must obtain medical clearance. After you are admitted, you will receive an email about obtaining medical clearance. It will have links to UAB's Student Health and Wellness (SHW) website and to the Patient Portal: <http://www.uab.edu/studenthealth/medical-clearance>. Links to these SHW webpages are also available on your BlazerNET account. You must meet the medical clearance deadline (e.g., Aug. 1, 2016 for Fall admission). If not, you will be blocked from registering for class. If you are already registered but don't submit all required records by the medical clearance deadline, your classes might get canceled.
Which immunizations do you need? To find out, go to <http://www.uab.edu/studenthealth/medical-clearance> and answer these questions:
-When did/will you matriculate (begin classes) at UAB? Summer term 2016 or later Prior to summer term 2016
-Are you a clinical or non-clinical student? Non-clinical (no patient contact) Clinical (patient contact)
-Are all of your courses completely online? Yes, all courses are completely online. No, at least one class will be on campus.
-Are you a United States citizen? Yes, I am a U.S. citizen. No, I am not a U.S. citizen

Level 1 Immunization. Most AMP students are classified as requiring Level 1 immunization which consists of the following: MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella), Tdap (Tetanus, Diphtheria, Acellular Pertussis), Varicella (Chickenpox/Shingles); and Tuberculosis (TB) screening. Immunizations and TB screening are available at SHW (1714 Ninth Avenue South) for a fee. Make an appointment by calling 205-934-3581 or by accessing the Patient Portal at <http://www.uab.edu/studenthealth/services/immunizations-and-tb-tests>

Submitting health records (for students who start after Summer 2016). Click "Forms" on Patient Portal. Then click "Immunizations entry form" and "Add immunization record." Upload scanned documents as JPEG, JPG, PNG, or GIF. Or, instead, you can fax your immunization records to 205-996-7468. As you complete these requirements, your immunization status will be reflected on your student profile in BlazerNET and on the Patient Portal under the "Immunizations" tab. Admission as a Non-Degree Seeking Student: UAB Graduate School, 205-934-8227 gradschool@uab.edu

1. Go to www.uab.edu/graduate, click on the green **APPLY NOW** box (top right), and create an *ApplyYourself* account.
2. After creating an application account, write down your *ApplyYourself* username and password, and then log out.
3. Log back into your *ApplyYourself* account and select **non-degree seeking** application.
4. Select education as your intended major and choose Ed Cert Other (or something similar) from the drop-down menu(s). Pay \$40 online (debit card or credit card) and click on SUBMIT. *NOTE: Mailing a check will greatly delay this process.*
5. Request official transcripts from all colleges attended, even if you took just one course at a given institution.
6. After your application and transcripts have arrived at the Graduate School, you will receive an email with instructions to complete a non-degree acknowledgement form indicating how you realize that only 12 credit hours taken with non-degree status can be used towards a degree. You will need to print this acknowledgement form, sign it, scan it, and return it as an email attachment.
7. After returning your non-degree acknowledgement form, you will receive an email from the Graduate School with the admission decision. Follow the instructions in this email, create (or reactivate) your BlazerID, and register for class.
8. Because of your non-degree seeking status, you will need overrides to register for AMP courses (except EDU 500). You can request a degree level override for education courses by sending an email to your program director with your student ID number ("B" plus 8 digits) and the course number (e.g. EHS 556) you wish to take. Content courses (e.g., biology) require overrides from their respective departments, which are usually in the College of Arts and Sciences. For this, you should also provide CRN.
9. During the semesters in which you take courses with non-degree seeking status, you are not eligible for financial aid.
10. If you need financial aid for taking courses before seeking admission to AMP, you can do so as a post-baccalaureate degree seeking student. However, as an undergraduate student, you will need to be enrolled in 12+ credit hours in order to receive a student loan. To apply, first go to <https://www.uab.edu/students/admissions/apply> and click OTHER at top right. When completing the application, **select "EDUCATION" as your major!** *NOTE: If you select the wrong undergraduate major, you will be assigned to an advisor outside the SOE. If this occurs, you must go online and change your UG major to Education. This way you will be assigned to an advisor in the School of Education (SOE). The SOE is not responsible for advising received outside of the SOE.*

Some Test-Taking Strategies

- 1) ETS offers free live webinars to help candidates succeed as they prepare for teacher licensure. These webinars offer in-depth information, study plan examples and the opportunity to ask questions. Topics include test overviews, free resources for test preparation and tips for reducing test anxiety. Registration opens approximately two weeks prior to the webinar date, and we encourage candidates to participate and register early. Scheduled webinar dates (12:00 noon, Alabama time) include: 7/28/15; 10/20/15; 1/26/16; 4/20/16; 7/26/16. For more information, visit our [Test Preparation Webinars](#) page.
- 2) Students should study for a Praxis test by purchasing study materials which are usually produced by the Educational Testing Service. These are offered online after registering for the Praxis. Test preparation materials can also be purchased at the UAB book store as well as at major book stores in shopping malls. Students are encouraged to take several practice tests (included in purchased test preparation materials) in a secluded area and by setting a timer for the allotted time. - 3) If students have a disability, they should register with UAB's Disability Support Services (205) 934-4205. This takes time. So, if students plan to seek a disability designation at UAB, they must start this process at least 3 months before the test date. Once students have been designated by UAB's Student Disability Services as having a disability, they will be allowed to take the Praxis with accommodations. The exact accommodation depends on the type of disability.
- 4) Test takers should arrive at the test center at least 30 minutes before the test is scheduled to start. Test-takers must be inside of the designated testing room before the time indicated on the instructions. For example, if test-takers are told to arrive by 10:30, this means that the door of the testing room closes at 10:30 and no one else is permitted to enter.
- 5) If test takers do not know the answer to a question, we recommend that they should "simply mark C". Test takers should not be concerned about marking C numerous times. "Simply marking C" works well since the passing score on the Praxis often corresponds to correct responses on about half of the questions. *NOTE: This approach will not work as well when a higher score is required. This approach also does not work on other types of exams such as Advanced Placement or Nursing Boards; it depends on the test.*
- 6) Of the questions to which test takers "simply mark C", about 25% will be correct. For example, if they "simply mark C" on 40 questions, about 10 will be correct. For some test takers, this is the difference between passing and not passing.
- 7) If test takers are slow readers, they should not get bogged down with reading long questions. Some of the Praxis questions are lengthy scenarios that take a long time to read; other questions might be somewhat confusing. When test takers who are slow readers see a long or confusing question, they should not even attempt to read it. Instead, they should "simply mark C" and go on to the next question. If they have time left at the end, they can come back to the long questions where they had "simply marked C."
- 8) One minute before the test ends, test takers should "simply mark C" on all of the remaining questions. That way, if they run out of time, they will have responded to all questions. For computer-based tests, the time appears on the screen. For paper-based tests, the test takers should wear a simple watch with clear numbers on it. They cannot rely on their cell phone for telling time because they are not allowed to bring cell phones into the testing room. They also cannot rely on the wall clock because sometimes it is not easily visible. When taking paper-based tests, the test takers may wish to write down the time when they start the test and the time when the test is supposed to end.

EDU 500, Field Experiences, Diversity, and edTPA

1) EDU 500

EDU 500 *Education as a Profession* is the introductory course on all AMP checklists. All AMP candidates must take EDU 500 in their first semester. EDU 500 guides candidates in meeting several required competencies and in creating an assessment portfolio on TaskStream. Candidates must consult with their faculty advisor about registering for other courses.

2) Field Experiences and Diversity

Candidates must complete at least 150-220 clock hours of field experiences in order to be eligible for their student teaching internship. These field experiences, which are similar to labs and rotations in other professions, are an integral part of many AMP courses. These field placements, which are arranged by the course instructor, provide candidates with experience working in diverse settings regarding grade levels, rural/suburban/urban, socio-economic status, English language learners, and special needs students. 3) edTPA

The ALSDE has established a final assessment will be required for issuing teacher certification. Starting with student teaching internship in Fall 2018, all interns must pass the multi-faceted edTPA in order to become certified. *NOTE: To better prepare students for edTPA, UAB's SOE has been making curricular adjustments since the 2015-16 school year.*

ELEMENTARY/EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (P-6)

Certification Checklist: 49-58 graduate semester credit hours

Additional Admission Requirements: P-6 Policies Regarding Admission to the AMP

Writing Competency: AMP candidates must demonstrate writing competence. This assessment will focus on the ability to utilize critical thinking skills and communicate through the written word. If an AMP applicant fails the writing sample, EDU 210 must be taken and a grade of "B" must be earned before unconditional admission is granted.

Interview: The AMP admission process requires an oral interview with a P-6 faculty member. Faculty use a semi-structured interview. Each faculty selects a set of structured pre-planned questions but also asks other questions that arise during the conversation. Candidates are evaluated on their use of language and standard grammar, professionalism in dress and manner, depth of thinking demonstrated in their responses, and ability to generate multiple possibilities for consideration. In this oral interview, faculty will attempt to determine the degree to which the candidate demonstrates the characteristics of personality, motivation, decision-making, and oral communication mentioned above. Professional dress is considered to be dress usually expected for a job interview in the business world. Punctuality is considered when faculty decide if the interview standard has been met.

Frequently-Asked Questions

When are classes taught?

EEC 650 and EEC 505 are taught on-line. ECY 600, EDU 500, and EEC 515 are on weekends. EEC 600 and EEC 612 are at night. Pedagogy courses have multiple sections (EEC 502, EEC 505, EEC 506, EEC 512, EEC 513, EEC 514, EEC 540, EDR 540, EDR 543).

Is it possible to work full time while completing the program?

The answer depends on your work schedule, your goals, and the specific courses involved. It is important to discuss your situation with your faculty adviser as early in your program as possible. Many courses require school-based experiences that must be completed during public school hours.

Is it possible to work full time during my internship?

Because the internship is full time and during regular public school hours, many students quit their jobs or take a leave of absence in order to complete it. It is important to decide very early in your program whether you will be able to make such a commitment.

How long will it take to complete the AMP in Elementary/Early Childhood Education?

Unfortunately there is no one answer to this question. Much depends on how many classes you want to take each semester. A full time student typically completes the program in six semesters. Below is the full-time course map (Option #1) plus two part-time options (#2 and #3).

***EARLIER GRADUATE COURSES:** If you have already completed graduate courses in your Teaching Field (TF) and/or earned a graduate degree, you might be able to use some of these TF courses (e.g., biology) towards alternative Class A teacher certification issued by the ALSDE. This does not apply to courses taken in a completed graduate degree used to meet ALSDE's GPA requirement. This also does not apply to education courses taken at another institution. Since each applicant's situation is different, individual approval must be sought. After submitting your admission application to UAB, you must send corresponding transcripts and course syllabi electronically to Dr. Spezzini and the faculty advisor for your TF (p. 2). The advisor selects potential TF courses and sends selected courses to Ms. Tashara Walker (tawalker@uab.edu), Director of the SOE Office of Student Services. If a course prefix differs from the TF prefix (i.e., a science course has a PT prefix) and the course has not been approved previously by ALSDE, Ms. Walker submits a request to the ALSDE for approval/denial. NOTE: After completing an MA and 18 graduate hours in a single teaching field (not a comprehensive field such as English Language Arts), you will be eligible to teach that subject in a community college.

SECONDARY: Recommended Course Map

This course map is based on the 2016 checklists for secondary teaching fields (6-12): English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science (incl., Biology, Chemistry, and Physics), and Social Science (incl., History). Each column represents an average of 3 courses per term (spring, summer, fall), which is what the majority of candidates take when working part-time. All candidates are advised to follow the course map for the semester in which you start. A similar course map is followed by candidates in single-subject K-12 teaching fields (art, music, ESL, French, and Spanish).

If you work full-time, you might take only 1 or 2 courses per term. If you are not working at all, you could 4 or 5 courses per term and be a full-time student. Please keep in mind that, as indicated on page 11, certain courses must be taken concurrently and in a specific order. You should always seek advice from your advisor, and then follow his/her advice.

1. Prior to the internship, candidates should read the Student Teaching website and the handbook posted at this site: <http://www.uab.edu/education/studentteaching/>
 2. Candidates must meet ALSDE regulations in effect at the time of student teaching and/or employment as hired intern.
 3. In January prior to the academic year in which candidates anticipate doing student teaching, they **must**:
 - a. Meet with their faculty advisor to ensure eligibility for student teaching;
 - b. Submit a *Student Teaching Application* **in person** to the SOE's Clinical Placements office located in the Education Building, Suite 232 (975-5777, dhedge@uab.edu), by January 31st, one term prior to fall internship and one full year prior to spring internship, and
 - c. Update this application immediately if the targeted semester or projected employment has changed.
 4. After the Student Teaching application has been submitted, the Office of Student Services (OSS) conducts a student teaching eligibility check and then notifies candidates of any missing items and/or their ineligibility. As their internship approaches, candidates will receive specific details of student teaching obligations, such as mandatory attendance of all student teachers at orientation sessions for their respective internship term (either fall or spring).
 5. **In order to be eligible for this student teaching internship**, candidates **must** have . . .
 - a. been unconditionally admitted to the AMP upon admission to UAB's Graduate School,
 - b. completed all courses in the AMP (with the possible exception of one or two secondary content courses),
 - c. met all requirements stipulated by OSS (EB 232) & Clinical Experiences office (EB 232), and
 - d. passed the corresponding Praxis test - Principles of Learning and Teaching (PLT), either #5622 or #5624, plus any additional tests required by program: Praxis #5204 (EL/ECE) or Praxis #5354 (CT, ECSE).
 6. Candidates **must** do their student teaching internship full-time for 15 weeks, which is almost the entire length of a school semester. They will be placed with cooperating teachers who are full-time teachers exclusively in the targeted teaching field, have taught within the targeted teaching field full-time for at least 3 years, and preferably hold Class A certification in this teaching field. Candidates will be observed approximately 3 or 4 times by a UAB supervisor. For K-12 subjects, one placement will be for 7½ weeks in an elementary school and another for 7½ weeks in a secondary school. Candidates in K-12 teaching fields will be observed at least twice in each of these two settings.
 7. If employed as a teacher, your employment must be less than 50 miles from UAB in order for the School of Education to provide on-site supervision of your field experiences and student teaching internship.
 8. Another option for meeting this Student Teaching requirement is to be employed full time in a SACS-accredited school. Such employment must be for teaching the entire day in the teaching field of the targeted certification area. For candidates in K-12 teaching fields, this can be done as follows:
 - a. Candidates in K-12 teaching fields need to be teaching approximately half the time (e.g., at least 2 periods a day) in one or more elementary grades (K-6) and teaching the other part of the time in one or more secondary grades (6-12), or vice versa. This can be done while employed at a middle school for teaching in at least one elementary grade level (e.g., 5th or 6th grade) and in at least one secondary grade level (e.g., 7th grade) or as an itinerant teacher at two or more schools (e.g., an elementary school and a high school). These hired interns will enroll in their internship course during either the Fall semester or the Spring semester.
 - b. Employment as a full time teacher during the school year at either the elementary or secondary level and placement as a student teacher at the other level for at least 2 periods a day for a full semester (such as in art or music) or during a summer program in a public school that is at least 6 weeks long (or the equivalent) and where there are at least 15 students per class. (NOTE: This latter option is usually for ESL.) Such placements must be approved several months in advance by the advisor, program director, and student teaching director.
- NOTE: Interns are not allowed to teach any other subject outside of the area of their certification.
9. Candidates **must** enroll in a corresponding internship seminar concurrently with their internship course.

Eligibility to be approved to student teach:

The ALSDE is currently in a transition period between requiring the Principles of Learning and Teaching (PLT) Praxis and the national student teacher assessment called edTPA. One semester before you anticipate starting your student teaching internship, you should check with the SOE Office of Student Services (EB 232) and the Student Teaching office (EB 232) to make sure as to which is needed. This will also be posted at <http://www.uab.edu/education/studentteaching/>
NOTE: Having passed these assessments is NOT required for submitting your student teaching application.

3) Application for Degree. Graduate School's <http://www.uab.edu/graduate/online-forms> : Click on "Forms Used to Complete Graduate Study." Then scroll down and click on "Application for Degree – Master's and EdS".

SOE graduate students must submit their Application for Degree to the SOE Office of Student Services (Suite 232) about **six months before they intend to graduate**. Failure to do so will delay their graduation by at least one semester.

The SOE recommends candidates to the ALSDE for **Class A Teacher Certification** in the targeted teaching field. After approving the recommendation, the ALSDE issues the certification. This process may take several months. Eligibility for certification expires if candidates do not submit application within 60 months of graduation!

2) Interim Employment Certificate in a Teaching Field (IEC): Becoming employed as a teacher while in the AMP

After you are unconditionally admitted to UAB's AMP, you can be hired with an **Interim Employment Certificate (IEC)** issued by the ALSDE. While in the AMP, you should not be hired with any other type of certificate. When a principal offers you a teaching position, you should immediately contact Ms. Ekandrea Tarver (edtarver@uab.edu), certification specialist in our Office of Student Services (OSS). Ms. Tarver will guide the school in submitting the IEC application to the ALSDE. *NOTE: The IEC used to be called the SAC or Special Alternative Certificate.*

Your eligibility for an IEC is based on ALSDE codes in effect at the time you are hired. Because ALSDE codes change frequently, you should be proactive regarding your own eligibility for an IEC. To do so, you should carefully read the information on the website provided above. To be hired as a teacher with the IEC, you must do the following:

- Be unconditionally admitted to AMP in the teaching field for which you have been offered a teaching job.
- Write "Eligible for Interim Employment Certificate in Teaching Field (IEC)" on employment application, resume, & cover letter.
- Be assigned to teach in your certification teaching field for most of day (from bus duty to bus duty) while teaching with an IEC.
- Contact **Ms. Ekandrea Tarver** (edtarver@uab.edu), SOE's Certification Specialist, introduce yourself as an AMP student, and inform her of your employment as a teacher and pending SAI request by your school (i.e., first step in the IEC process).
- Ask your school's HR representative to send a Supplement SA1 request to Ms. Tarver on official school district letterhead with the following information: Your full name, last 4 digits of your SSN, teaching field and grade span that you will be teaching in your new position, and the address of your school's HR office (or other office) for receiving the SA1 paperwork from UAB. *NOTE: After UAB sends the SAI paperwork to your school district, your HR office will send the IEC application to the ALSDE.*
- Request an official copy of your UAB transcript (in progress and with current courses) from UAB's transcript ordering website: <http://www.uab.edu/students/one-stop/grades/academic-transcripts>. Indicate for official UAB transcript to be sent **electronically** to Office of Student Services at SOEtranscripts@uab.edu. If prompted (even if requesting an electronically-submitted transcript), provide this address: SOE Teacher Certification, 1720 2nd Ave South-EB 232, Birmingham AL 35294-1250; Tel 205-934-7530.
- You may complete up to three years of employment while holding a valid IEC. All three IECs must be issued within a four consecutive scholastic year time period. After finishing your first year of teaching with an IEC, you must visit your school's HR office and submit an application to the ALSDE for your second IEC. After finishing your second year of teaching with an IEC, you must again visit your school's HR office and submit an application to the ALSDE for your third IEC. By the end of your third year of teaching (or before), you must complete the AMP and graduate with a master's. An individual who has not completed all requirements for Class A certification by the expiration of the third IEC is not eligible for certification through the IEC approach.
- After graduating from the AMP, you must submit an application for alternative Class A certification to the SOE Office of Student Services (EB 232). After verifying this application, the SOE will forward your Class A certification application to the ALSDE.
- Some schools do not consider AMP students for teaching positions even though they are eligible for an IEC.

For updated and official information, click on the links "Provisional Certificates" and "Other Approaches" in the horizontal gold menu stripe and carefully read all of the links. The following information is a brief unofficial overview and should NOT be used as a guide.

- a) **Provisional Certificate in a Teaching Field (PCTF).** The PCTF was formerly called the ABC or Alternative Baccalaureate Certificate. This approach allows schools to hire uncertified candidates who have passed two exams (AECAP Basic Skills and a Praxis Subject Test), obtained background clearance, and met all other ALSDE regulations. In the first year of teaching with the PCTF, candidates must take 2 of 4 designated courses and then submit an application for the 2nd PCTF through the school's HR office. In the second year of teaching, candidates must take the other 2 designated courses and submit an application for the 3rd PCTF through the school's HR office. After the third year of teaching with a PCTF, candidates will be eligible for a Class B teaching certificate and must submit the corresponding application through the school's HR office. Candidates must be aware of the many requirements associated with this approach. *NOTE: If you are admitted to the AMP but are hired to teach in another field, you must immediately withdraw from the AMP and pursue the PCTF in the field for which you have been hired.*
- b) **Emergency Certification.** This emergency certificate allows schools to hire uncertified teachers who are ineligible for the IEC or PCTF. A person can have Emergency Certification only ONCE in their life and for just one year. If you have been admitted to the AMP and are hired before the school year starts, you should make sure that the school is seeking an IEC on your behalf and **NOT** an Emergency Certificate. *NOTE: Many school administrators refer to the IEC as emergency certification, but it is not.*
- c) **Adjunct Instructor Permit.** For employment as a teacher half-time or less. Adjuncts are not eligible for benefits.
- d) **Certification by Test (CBT).** The CBT approach allows certified teachers to become certified in additional teaching fields. After your second year of full time teaching in a teaching field for which you are certified and after passing a Praxis subject test in a new teaching field, you are eligible for Class B certification in this other teaching field. You should submit your CBT application directly to the ALSDE. *NOTE: Secondary and Single-subject teachers cannot use this approach to become certified in Early Childhood or Elementary.*

I am aware of the following:

- 1) Applicants should read and follow the stipulations in this information packet and keep themselves informed regarding any changes.
- 2) All test scores and regulations described in this information packet are **valid only up until the date on this packet**.
- 3) Before registering for an exam, applicants should check the ALSDE website for current exam codes and scores: <http://www.ets.org/praxis/al>
- 4) Policies are established by the ALSDE, these policies are subject to change, and all candidates must abide by all such changes.
- 5) Admission **applications** MUST be submitted to UAB by the deadline: it is usually OK for exam scores to arrive a few days after the deadline.
- 6) Applicants should take any required UG content courses at a community college or at UAB as non-degree graduate students (NOTE: Some programs allow candidates to meet these requirements by taking graduate courses during their first semester in the AMP). Upon submitting a non-degree seeking graduate application, they should mark EDUCATION as their major and OTHER as the reason.
- 7) When communicating with UAB staff by email, candidates should use professional email etiquette, identify themselves, and provide some background. After obtaining a UAB email www.uab.edu/BlazerID, they must check it frequently and always use it in official communication.
- 8) Candidates should not take more than 5 AMP courses before being unconditionally admitted to the AMP. This might include graduate content courses in a secondary teaching field taken at another institution and approved by SOE.
- 9) AMP candidates must take all education courses on their certification checklist (**no substitutions**) and follow all procedures in effect during their program in order to be awarded a master's degree from UAB and alternative Class A teacher certification from the ALSDE.
- 10) If recommended by a course instructor or the program director, candidates must take an academic writing course: GRD 726 and/or 727.
- 11) Candidates must always demonstrate a high level of professional dispositions worthy of the teaching profession as described in the Model Code of Ethics for Educators which will soon be posted on the SOE website. Failure to do so will result in being exited from the SOE.
- 12) Candidates must maintain a 3.25 GPA. The Graduate School exits candidates after the second semester of academic probation (below 3.0).
- 13) Before the internship, candidates must successfully complete all **field experiences** (150-220 hours) in placements arranged by instructors.
- 14) Candidates must confer with their SOE faculty advisor or program director whenever they have questions concerning their program.
- 15) Advisors and program directors give advice but they are not responsible for a candidate's program or progress towards degree.
- 16) When doing their student teaching internship, candidates must adhere to the ALSDE policies and regulations in effect at that time (and not those in effect on the date of this information packet): <http://www.uab.edu/education/studentteaching/>
- 17) If AMP candidates are hired as teachers with the Interim Educator Certificate (IEC), they must teach almost the entire day in their teaching field for meeting requirements of the IEC. They must teach 100% of the day in their teaching field during their internship semester.
- 18) If candidates are in a K-12 field and hired with an IEC, their teaching position must include both elementary and secondary with at least 2 periods/day at each level. If not, they must student teach 2 periods/day for a semester or during a full summer approved in advance by UAB.
- 19) Elementary/Early Childhood candidates must maintain a 3.0 GPA in **Pedagogy I** (EEC 502, EEC 506, EEC 540, EEC 594; EDR 540) to progress to **Pedagogy II**, and a 3.0 GPA in **Pedagogy II** (EEC 512, EEC 513, EEC 514, EEC 594; EDR 543) to progress to internship.
- 20) To be eligible for starting their student teaching internship, candidates must meet all requirements on their respective checklist: www.uab.edu/education/checklists and also on the student teaching website: <http://www.uab.edu/education/studentteaching/>
- 21) To be eligible for certification upon graduating, candidates must have at least a 3.25 GPA on their degree-issuing transcript.
- 22) Candidates must submit their **Application for Degree** to the Office of Student Services (OSS) about **6 months before they plan to graduate**. Failure to do so will delay their graduation by at least one semester.
- 23) Candidates must submit an Application for Certification to the OSS in their final semester. Certification eligibility expires in 60 months.
- 24) Applicants who complete their certification program in Fall 2018 and thereafter will also need to pass all components on a nationally-scored multi-faceted assessment called edTPA which will take place throughout their internship semester.
- 25) Upon discontinuing studies for more than a year, even with leave of absence, candidates must follow the program in effect upon re-entry.
- 26) To be eligible for seeking admission to the AMP, candidates must meet the following prerequisites. NOTE: Other criteria must also be met.
 - 27) Cumulative unrounded 2.75 GPA on degree-issuing undergraduate transcript from regionally-accredited college (or 3.0 for MA degree).
 - 28) Required content courses in the targeted teaching field or, depending on the program, a plan for completing these courses
 - 29) Passing score on all 3 parts of the AECAP Basic Skills
 - 30) Passing score on Praxis subject test for the targeted teaching field required by the ALSDE on the date of the exam
(except for applicants to the AMP in ESL who, to be admitted, must pass either the ESL Praxis or the MAT or the GRE).
- 31) *International students & non-native English speakers* must pass TOEFL, IELTS, or Level 5 at INTO-UAB's Academic English Program.
