




What are export controls?

- U.S. Export Controls are a set of laws and implementing regulations through which various Federal Agencies
 - govern the transfer of, and limits access to,
 - sensitive equipment, software, technical data, technology and services,
 - by certain foreign entities and foreign persons,
 - in order to promote several of the Government's objectives and interests:
 - protect U.S. national security
 - advance U.S. economic interests
 - promote U.S. foreign policy objectives

Who are the Primary Export Control Regulators?



Department of State, Directorate of Defense Trade Controls (DDTC)

International Traffic in Arms Regulations (ITAR)

- Relates to military and defense articles and services, designed or configured for military applications, with no equivalent civilian or commercial products
 - Controlled items found on the US Munitions List



Department of Commerce, Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS)

Export Administration Regulations (EAR)

- Relates to "dual use" (civilian and military) items, information or software
 - Controlled items found on the Commerce Control List



Department of Treasury, Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC)

Administers and enforces economic and trade sanctions
