AN AMBITIOUS TREATMENT TARGET TO HELP END THE AIDS EPIDEMIC

In December 2014 in Paris, France, UNAIDS released the '90-90-90' Initiative with the goals of:

90% OF ALL PERSONS WITH HIV KNOWING DIAGNOSIS

90% OF THOSE DIAGNOSED ON TREATMENT

90% OF THOSE ON TREATMENT ACHIEVING VIRAL **SUPPRESSION**

Modeling suggests achieving these targets by 2020 will enable the world to end the AIDS epidemic by 2030, which in turn will generate profound humanitarian, health and economic benefits.
