What does it mean to be a preceptor?

As a preceptor for UAB medical students, you will contribute to the training of the next generation of physicians. Your participation will enable third-year medical students to learn from your clinical practice and empower them to use skills learned in the classroom while caring for patients in the community. Being a UAB preceptor also gives you access to a wealth of resources that will enable you to become a better provider and lead a more effective practice.

Who can be a preceptor?

Any licensed, board-certified family medicine practitioner in the state of Alabama can be a preceptor for our students. There are some restrictions on preceptors that may apply to you depending on your clinic's location and the time you are able to commit to having students.

What is expected of a preceptor each year?

After initial credentialing, we encourage each preceptor to take at least three students per year. Each adjunct faculty member (preceptor) is asked to precept students at their clinic for four weeks of clinical training. The preceptor will be asked to provide two formal evaluations and sign off on the student's clinical diagnosis encounters throughout the student's clinical training period. Preceptors will also be asked to write a summary statement about the student's overall performance upon completion of their training.

Will my staff have to be involved in this process?

If you wish to designate scheduling and other logistical responsibilities to a staff member, that is completely fine. Our team does ask that you designate an office contact so that we can keep all communication streamlined and organized.

Will I be paid as a preceptor?

We are currently unable to offer monetary compensation for preceptors, but there are several benefits that preceptors can access during their volunteer faculty appointment. You will also have the opportunity to earn 20 credits of CME through the AAFP throughout your year of direct teaching of medical students. A full list of benefits offered is included in this packet.

How do I start?

To become a preceptor, fill out the information survey online or email Adrienne Baltscheit (adriennesavage@uabmc.edu). Once we have processed your information, you will be asked to send the following documents to our office:

- Official medical school transcript (must be mailed directly or emailed from medical school)
- Information form (can be filled and submitted electronically via email or mailed)
- Your current CV

Once we receive the documents listed above, we will verify your Alabama medical license and board certification. After these steps are complete, we will send a letter to your office that you must sign to accept your voluntary faculty appointment and consent to a background check. When we receive your cleared background check, you will be appointed as a preceptor.

PRECEPTOR BENEFITS

Family Medicine providers who serve as preceptors for students in the Department of Family and Community Medicine share in the rich tradition of role modeling and mentorship in medical education. - Access to Department of Family and Community Medicine interdisciplinary team for consultation, including psychologists, dietitians, physical therapists, and others
- Access to all resources at teaching physician.org (ask for login info)
- Brief and practical "Teaching Tips" sent regularly via email
- Access to the UAB Recreation Center at reduced faculty price
- Appreciation gifts and recognition events
- Certificate acknowledging your contribution as a partner in education and preparing UAB Family and Community Medicine students
- Access to ongoing Society for the Teaching of Family Medicine (STFM) projects, including benefits for maintenance of certification (MOC)

I WANT TO BE A PRECEPTOR: NOW WHAT?

Document Collection and Verification

You will be asked to send your medical school transcripts, data verification form, and current CV to our office. Once verified, you will receive confirmation within 3-4 weeks.

Complete Online Preceptor Application

After we receive your completed application, we will reach out to you within 2-3 weeks.

Appointment Letter and Background Check

After we receive your documents, our office will mail your appointment letter and a document that asks for consent to perform a background check. Once you complete your background check, you will be a volunteer faculty member and added to our website.

Scheduling and Student Matching

Once we receive all of your documents and you are credentialed, you will work with our program coordinator to determine schedule availability for the semester.

Training and Student Assessment

You will participate in an orientation session with our medical education director before your students arrive. They will answer all of your questions and prepare you for student evaluations. Evaluations will be completed via MedHub online.

Receive Your Benefits

After you successfully complete orientation, all described benefits will be available to you.

ABOUT FAMILY AND COMMUNITY MEDICINE

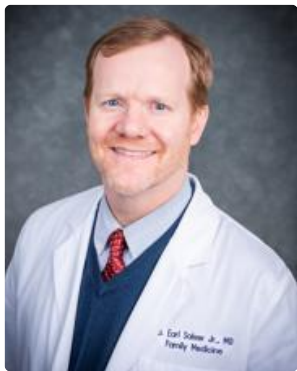
