UAB Police provides training for response to active shooter events

The UAB Police Department is conducting **A.L.I.C.E.** (Alert, Lockdown, Information, Counter, and Evacuation) Training for faculty, staff, and students. This training is designed to give participants response options if they encounter an active shooter/violent intruder event.

During the past 15 years, active shooter/violent intruder events have led to a need for this training and **A.L.I.C.E.** provides a realistic approach to these events. Our goal is to move beyond the traditional "lockdown" method, which is not sufficient to protect students, faculty, and staff.

Questions about A.L.I.C.E.

What does A.L.I.C.E. stand for?

- Alert – those around you
- Lockdown – lock and barricade doors, entryways
- Information – inform others so they may take the appropriate actions
- Counter – fight back using the "swarm" technique
- Evacuate – get as many people as possible away from the danger zone

This training is free.

How long is the training?

The training is 45-90 minutes long depending on questions afterward. *When scheduling, please let us know your time limits so we can provide the best training experience.*

Who should attend the training presentation?

Everyone who attends classes or works on campus can benefit from this training.

Are all A.L.I.C.E training presentations at UAB the same?

No, each presentation is unique to the groups that request the training. Our ALICE Instructor will tailor the presentation to include the buildings you attend class in or work in every day.

Police Week

May 11-17



National Police Week pays special recognition to those law-enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others. In 1962 President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation that designated May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which that date falls as Police Week.

The memorial service began in 1982 as a gathering in Senate Park of approximately 120 survivors and supporters of law enforcement. Decades later, the event, more commonly known as National Police Week, has grown to a series of events which attracts thousands of survivors and law-enforcement officers to our nation's capital each year.

Currently tens of thousands of law-enforcement officers from around the world converge on Washington, D.C., to participate in a number of planned events that honor those who have made the ultimate sacrifice. One event is a candlelight vigil on Tuesday, May 13, sponsored by National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund.

National Police Week draws between 25,000 and 40,000 attendees. The attendees come from departments throughout the United States and agencies from around the world.
