A Resolution Opposing Proposed Changes to Title IX Regulations

1 WHEREAS the University of Alabama at Birmingham Undergraduate Student 2 Government Association has the honor and responsibility of representing the entire 3 undergraduate student voice; and 4 5 WHEREAS it is the duty of the USGA to lead the undergraduate student body towards 6 positive and relevant changes; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the Department of Education has proposed changes to Title IX regulations 9 and how universities handle reported sexual harassment; and, 10 11 WHEREAS, under the new policy, schools will likely investigate fewer complaints, and 12 the Department of Education will hold fewer schools accountable for ensuring 13 campuses are free of sexual harassment and assault; and,¹² 14 WHEREAS, the overwhelming effect of the new rules is to limit schools' obligations to 15 students who file complaints of sexual harassment and violence under Title IX; and,³ 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the new rules would require schools to only investigate the most extreme 19 forms of harassment and assault; and, 20 21 WHEREAS, the rules would allow schools to eliminate protections for students studying 22 abroad; and, 23 24 WHEREAS, the new rules would require schools to establish live cross-examination, 25 where an accused student's representative would be able to directly question a survivor 26 in real time; and,⁴ 27

28 WHEREAS, the process of reporting a sexual assault can be traumatic and painful, and 29 live cross-examination of survivors will rehash such trauma. Brett Sokolow, president of 30 the Association of Title IX Administrators projected this to lead to a 50 percent drop in future reports⁵; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, the new rules would make it impossible for survivors to request that their 34 perpetrator be moved out of their dorm or classes as an interim accommodation; and, 35 WHEREAS, the Department's rules would require schools to adopt a higher standard of 36 37 proof only for sexual misconduct complaints, as opposed to other nonsexual campus misconduct; and,⁶ 38 39 40 WHEREAS, the new rules would allow schools to use unregulated "mediation" processes in lieu of investigations; and, 41 42 43 WHEREAS, the new rules would allow schools to delay investigations for unspecified periods when a concurrent law enforcement investigation is ongoing; and 44 45 46 WHEREAS, under the new rules, colleges and universities would be obligated to take 47 action only if students make formal complaints to designated Title IX and high-level 48 school officials; and,⁷ 49 WHEREAS, more than 90% survivors of sexual assault on college campuses already 50 51 do not report assault when it occurs; and,⁸ 52 53 WHEREAS, the Department's rules would narrow the definition of sexual harassment to 54 include only those offenses which occur within a schools' programs or activities, which does not include off-campus housing and activities not organized by the University, thus 55

- 59 WHEREAS, out of eight major universities that provided data, five had more reports of 60 sexual assault from off campus than on school property; and.¹¹

- 62 WHEREAS, 20% of female, 4% of male, and 21% of transgender, genderqueer, and 63 gender nonconforming students are sexually assaulted while in college; and,¹²

 65 WHEREAS, an assailant has a 99% chance of avoiding a prison sentence; and¹³,

 67 WHEREAS, 90% of sexual assaults are committed by repeat offenders; and,¹⁴

 69 WHEREAS, if assailants were stopped after their second offense, then 59% of sexual
 70 assaults would be prevented; and,¹⁵
- 71 72 WHEREAS between 2015 and 2017, UAB's campus has had 80% increase of incidence
- of dating violence, 400% increase of incidence of stalking, and domestic violence
- ⁷⁴ incidence remains a consistent issue¹⁶

- or may adopt, resolutions supporting similar sentiments; then,
