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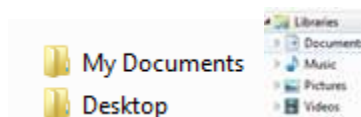
SITUATION:

I have documents (and such) that are important to my work, things that I definitely don't want to be lost or harmed.

What can I do to be sure that they are protected in all possible situations -- such as a virus, or hard drive failure, or theft?

SOLUTION:

- Save them on a **network** drive.
 - That's any drive that is H:drive through Z:drive -- including of course S:drive.
 - That means it's stored on our servers (in our server room and backup locations), and backed up twice daily.
- Do **NOT** save them on your **local** drive (i.e., your C:drive).
 - Because that is not backed up; and in a worst-case-scenario, anything saved there could be lost. ☹
 - In other words, you should **NOT** save anything important in:
 - Your C:drive in general
 - Including any of these locations (which are part of C:drive)



Looking Forward...

To help with this, in future Tips of the Week, you will see how to:

- change the default "save as" location.
- create shortcuts on your desktop to things stored on the network, to give you safety and convenience.
