A single <u>underlined letter</u> – how is that helpful to me?

SITUATION:

When I right click on a word, I see options listed in the context menu. Most of these options have a single underlined letter in them.

Why? What is that? Is it useful to me?

SOLUTION:

Yes, it definitely can be useful. It can speed you up in doing things, especially things that you do repeatedly.

The overall concept is:

Pressing the letter that's underlined is the same as selecting the word.

So for example:

1. Right click on "tip" in this sentence.

- 2. You'll see multiple choices including
- 3. Of course you could click to choose that, but notice that the " \underline{y} " in it is underlined.
- 4. That underline tells you that you can simply tap the [y] key, for the same result.

This is just one of many examples.

Now that you know this one-underlined-letter trick, you will see all sorts of opportunities to use it in Word, Excel, Outlook, etc.
